MacArthur is president and publisher of *Harper's Magazine*; Jeff Madrick is a regular contributor to the *New York Review of Books* and is a former economics columnist for *The New York Times*.

Go to school, keep your grades up, go to college. That's what we tell kids—over and over. What if just leaving your apartment and walking up the block is risky? What if it feels safer to stay home, play video games, and keep a low profile? When you do go out, head somewhere safe, like the teen center or the basketball court. That was the world of African American teenager Jesse Jean.

Jesse lived half a block from host Katie Davis in Washington, D.C. He was lucky enough to get a scholarship to a private boarding school and brave enough to take it. Katie kept in touch with Jesse as he moved into this new world. We hear three stories covering seven years, starting in summer 2001.

Francine Achbar, who is the executive director of the New Center for Arts and Culture in Boston, was a writer, producer, and executive at WBZ-TV in Boston and American Public Television. **Trivia bonus:** Achbar is known to be the *Says You!* "fashion plate."

Carolyn Faye Fox is a contributing editor at *The Improper Bostonian* and an accomplished food critic, travel writer, and ad hoc marketing consultant. **Trivia bonus:** Fox enjoys stumping her teammates with devious definitions of Scottish derivation.
