LOYALTY: HOW DO YOU RATE

The following 10 questions are intended to determine your loyalty to your school. This test was inspired by the loyalty tests that Japanese Americans were forced to take during their internment during World War II. Of course, unlike the loyalty test Japanese Americans were compelled to take, this quiz will not result in any consequences — positive or negative. The results that you see at the end of this quiz are fake and serve only to draw comparisons between this test and the Japanese American loyalty test. When you calculate your score at the end of this guiz and read about the consequences of your score, think about what it would be like if the consequences were real and you and your friends were forced to take this test without knowing why. If the consequences of this test were real, would you answer differently?

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WHERE DO YOU STAND WHEN IT COMES TO SCHOOL LOYALTY? Y

ou will fall into one of five categories.

School Leader With Privileges (scores of +16 to +25)

If your score falls into this category, you are an excellent and loyal student. As a result of your hard work and your dedication to your school, you will be rewarded with a leadership post at your school as well as with certain privileges that go along with being a school leader. These privileges include being allowed to sit in a special section at athletic events and all school functions, being first in line for food, not needing a hall pass and so on.

Status Quo (scores of +1 to +15)

If your score falls into this category, you are contributing to the well-being of your school, and demonstrating some loyalty in the process. You will be able to go about your business at school as a "regular" student. In other words, your day-to-day experience at school is unlikely to change much.

Probation (scores of o to −5)

If your score falls into this category, you need to work on your dedication to your school a little bit. Teachers and administrators will be paying close attention to you to make sure you are moving in the right direction. You will remain on probation until you demonstrate greater dedication to your school. Should teachers and/or administrators observe you moving in the wrong direction, however, they can impose detention on you.

Detention (scores of –6 to –15)

If your score falls into this category, you have a history of little or no dedication, or loyalty to your school. You will serve a period of detention until you're able to show that you have a greater dedication and loyalty. (At that time you will be placed on probation.) While serving detention, you will have to write a report on the importance of loyalty and, upon completing that, an essay on what your school means to you.

Reeducation School (scores of -16 to -25)

If your score falls into this category, you have demonstrated an extremely negative attitude and even negative behavior toward your school. Teachers and administrators worry that your current state of disloyalty cannot be handled inhouse. As a result, you will be sent to a re-education school with other disloyal students. While there, you will undergo a rigorous schedule and will be allowed few (if any) liberties.

FINAL CONSEQUENCES

Japanese Americans did not know what their results from this test would mean. Did they face death, deportation or incarceration? The questions on the actual loyalty test and the scoring system used by the United States government determined the fate of Japanese-American citizens. Read the **LOYALTY QUESTIONNIARE** (page 4) and the **SCORING THE LOYALTY QUESTIONNAIRE** (page 7) and compare them to the test you've taken.

Think about what it would be like if the consequences were real—would you answer differently? How would you feel about taking this test if you didn't know its purpose?

SCORING THE LOYALTY QUESTIONNAIRE

(Note: the scoring has been modified from the original for the purpose of this exercise, but it reflects the scoring system used by the U.S. government.)

Subtract 1 for each year you have lived outside the U.S. If you have traveled outside the U.S. to conduct business for any foreign country, your score for the entire questionnaire is o.
- 14. If you have been employed by any foreign government agency or if you were an instructor in a foreign school or a foreign language or religious school in the U.S., subtract 3. If you were employed by a foreign-owned firm or by a foreign language newspaper in the U.S., subtract 2. If you were employed by a steamship line, an airline that flies outside the U.S. or by the merchant marine, subtract 2.
